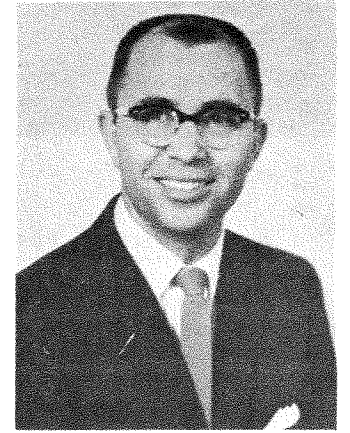

MISSION DEPARTMENT PLANNED

ST. LOUIS CHRISTIAN COLLEGE announces the appointment of Glenn H. Bourne to the office of vice president, effective December 1st. This is an important step in the development program of SLCC. Brother Bourne will assume the business management responsibilities of the college as assistant to Pres. Perrine and will develop a Missions Department as a member of the college faculty.

INTRODUCING: OUR NEW COLLEAGUE

Glenn H. Bourne was born December 19, 1928, in Alma, Nebraska, where he spent the first eleven years of his life. There he received Christ as Savior at the age of eight. His father, H. A. Bourne, was the minister of the Alma congregation. From Alma the family moved to North Platte where Glenn graduated from High School at the age of 16 in 1945.

In the fall of 1945 Glenn enrolled in Johnson Bible College where his mother had served as secretary to the esteemed founder and president, Ashley S. Johnson and also as instructor in Greek. During his junior and senior years Glenn served the Alleghany Church of Christ near Cambria, Virginia, traveling 263 miles each way each week end.

Following his graduation with the A.B. degree in 1949 Glenn entered the School of Religion, Butler University. During his graduate studies he served

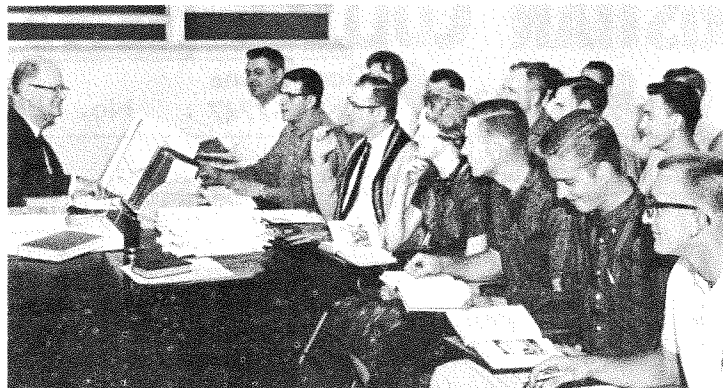

INTEREST GROWS IN NIGHT CLASSES

The night classes of St. Louis Christian College serve a two-fold purpose. Brethren in the area are provided an opportunity to share in the course offerings of the college, and commuting students who can attend only on a two day a week basis gain thereby a larger selection of courses. Classes are conducted on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 10 P.M.

Six courses are currently offered. Enrollment in three of the courses exceed seating capacity of our classrooms and have been transferred to the cafeteria.

Pictured are the classes being taught by Professors Johnston (Archeology) and Hetzel (Introduction to Christian Philosophy) and a typical scene in the college cafeteria. Dean Boatman conducts a class in Bible Survey, Prof McGee is teaching a course on the Epistles of Peter and Jude, and classes in Song Leadership and Refresher Shorthand are conducted by Prof. Larry Cripe and Instructor George Tietze.

The next schedule of night classes will begin concurrently with the opening of the Spring semester, Tuesday January 28. The several courses are taught on a one night a week basis (either on Tuesday or on Thursday evenings), with 16 class sessions of 90 minutes class time per semester.

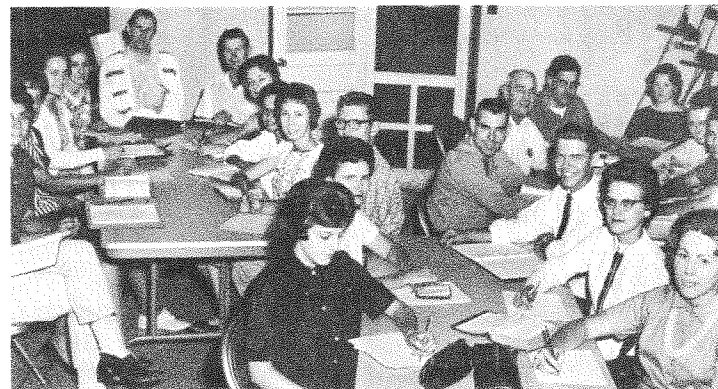


CONCERNING PRESIDENT PERRINE

the Mt. Auburn Christian Church near Edinburg, Indiana and the Church of Christ in Palestine, Ohio. In the latter ministry he met Carolyn Teaford who became a student at Johnson Bible College, and his wife on June 9, 1953. Glenn received his B.D. degree from the School of Religion, majoring in New Testament and minoring in Practical Ministries. He also completed residence requirements for the M.A. degree, majoring in Church History.

The next two years were spent in the ministry of the Traders Point Christian Church near Indianapolis. His ministry with the Bridgeport congregation, now in its eighth year, began in December 1955. This ministry has been especially marked by missionary emphasis. The first year saw missionary giving rise to over \$4,000, and a steady increase follow year after year. A total of \$98,500 has already been given and the \$100,000 mark is expected to be reached by December

A \$48,000 educational unit was added and paid for within the first year of use by the congregation of 330 members, and the main structure refurnished and redecorated. The morning service has been broadcasted live for the past three years. Glenn has sung with the Way of Gladness Quartet over radio for the past seven years. Eleven young people from the congregation have gone to Bible College during his Bridgeport ministry.

The Bournes have four children - David (9), Miriam (7), Sarah (5), and Mark (4). We extend a warm welcome to the Bourne family and expect great things to be accomplished through them.

The Jennings congregation has purchased a choice site in the growing Blackjack community to the north and east of the college campus. The purchase includes a substantial and spacious three story farmhouse which will serve as living quarters for the Bourne family and temporary assembly facilities for the new congregation. The Jennings church will also assume a portion of Bro. Bourne's salary. At least one other area congregation has announced intent to increase their generous monthly appropriation to St. Louis Christian College as an encouragement to all concerned in this forward step. The new congregation will be located on Old Halls Ferry Road and Rolling Hills Drive, north of Interstate 270 (By-pass 66) and just south of Parker Road.
